

Half Term Break

Please remember that school will close at 2.00pm on Friday 14th February, for the half term break. The children will return to school on Tuesday 25th February as Monday 24th is a training day.

In Mass this week, we will listen to Luke's Gospel.

Luke 2:22-40 22 And when the day came for them to be purified in keeping with the Law of Moses, they took him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord- observing what is written in the Law of the Lord: Every first-born male must be consecrated to the Lord- and also to offer in sacrifice, in accordance with what is prescribed in the Law of the Lord, a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons. Now in Jerusalem there was a man named Simeon. He was an upright and devout man; he looked forward to the restoration of Israel and the Holy Spirit rested on him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death until he had set eyes on the Christ of the Lord. Prompted by the Spirit he came to the Temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus to do for him what the Law required, he took him into his arms and blessed God; and he said: Now, Master, you are letting your servant go in peace as you promised; for my eyes have seen the salvation which you have made ready in the sight of the nations; a light of revelation for the gentiles and glory for your people Israel. As the child's father and mother were wondering at the things that were being said about him, Simeon blessed them and said to Mary his mother, 'Look, he is destined for the fall and for the rise of many in Israel, destined to be a sign that is opposed- and a sword will pierce your soul too -- so that the secret thoughts of many may be laid bare.' There was a prophetess, too, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was well on in years. Her days of girlhood over, she had been married for seven years before becoming a widow. She was now eighty-four years old and never left the Temple, serving God night and day with fasting and prayer. She came up just at that moment and began to praise God; and she spoke of the child to all who looked forward to the deliverance of Jerusalem. When they had done everything the Law of the Lord required, they went back to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. And as the child grew to maturity, he was filled with wisdom; and God's favour was with him.



The Feast of Our lady of Lourdes - World Day for the Sick


The World Day for the Sick, February IIth, was introduced by St. John Paul II to help us remember to pray for all those who are ill and for their caregivers. He chose this day because it coincides with the Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes; which commemorates the appearances of Our Lady to Bernadette Soubirous, our school patron saint. Our Lady made I8 appearances to Bernadette, the first one being on IIth February 1858 and the last one on I6th July in the same year. Lourdes has been a site of pilgrimage, renowned for healing, ever since.

Our Lady of Lourdes is the class saint for IOB. The children in Miss Bowden's class will celebrate the feast day and can come into school wearing their own clothes on IIth February. We will have a whole school mass on IIth February at Holy Family church 9.30am to which parents are invited to attend.

School of Sanctuary Update

Mrs Canning's Migration Story.

I was born and raised in Dundalk, Co. Louth, sharing a secondary school with the Corrs, interviewing Steve Staunton for my school magazine and even managing to achieve fifteen minutes of fame next to Dustin the Turkey on Den TV.

After completing my degree in University College Dublin, I was offered a place on a teacher training course in Ireland, specialising in English; I was also offered a teaching position in Dubai. But no, the bright lights of Birmingham were calling and in September 2008 I moved to Bartley Green. My plan was simple: train to be a teacher, finish the course in a year, and then head back home. Just one year, I told myself. Easy, right? Well, it turns out the universe had other plans. That one year turned into something much bigger, thanks to a city I never expected to fall for: Birmingham.

Let me start with my first impressions. I arrived ready to dive into my studies but completely unprepared for the Brummie accent. "Yow alright?" threw me off entirely. Was it a question? A statement? A secret code? As much as I tried to embrace this new adventure, there were things I deeply missed: my family and friends, of course, but if I'm honest my deeper yearning was for Tayto crisps, Club Orange, and, of course, a proper portion of curry chips. No amount of hunting could replace those little comforts of home so I resorted to smuggling Lyon's tea back after every trip to Ireland. The curry chip in my pocket did not fare so well!

But as I settled in, something clicked. People from every corner of the world living, working, and celebrating together. It was like a living tapestry of cultures, and I was hooked.

What made it even more special was knowing that my family's roots were intertwined with Birmingham's story. My parents had moved here in the 1970s, looking for work and a better life. My two older sisters were born here, adding to the family legacy. After seven years, they returned to Ireland, but the connection to Birmingham never really faded. Even my brother came back here years later for work. So, in a way, I wasn't just starting a new chapter—I was continuing a family tradition.

Training to be a teacher was no walk in the park. There were moments of self-doubt, cultural adjustments (little break, copybooks and principal, for instance), and the occasional day where I questioned if I'd made the right choice. Teaching phonics was particularly challenging. As an Irish person who struggled with 'th' words, it felt almost cruel to teach children how to pronounce "think" when I couldn't get it right myself! I'd break out in a cold sweat every time a school trip to the Thinktank was mentioned—the irony wasn't lost on me. Through it all, the resilience my family instilled in me kept me going. Hard work, commitment, and service to the community weren't just words; they were a way of life.

Birmingham's people made it easy to stay. I found friendships that felt like family and communities that welcomed me with open arms; the staff at St. Bernadette's became my extended family. The city's heartbeat—its mix of history, progress, and endless cups of tea—became my own. By the time I finished my course, the idea of leaving felt unthinkable. Fast forward sixteen years and I'm married to a Blues fan (much to the horror of my Villa-loving family) and have a two-year-old child with a very pronounced Brummie accent.

Looking back, I came to Birmingham expecting a temporary stop. What I found was a home. It's funny how life works like that. The city, with all its quirks and charms, became part of my story. So here I am, years later, still in Birmingham, still learning, still teaching, still missing Tayto crisps, and still trying to master the art of navigating Spaghetti Junction without panicking. And you know what? I wouldn't have it any other way.



Pilgrimage Of Hope

Many thanks to Miss Finnegan for preparing our school Pilgrimage this week. Six stations were created to allow the children to reflect on how it might feel to be seeking asylum in a foreign country. The children considered what it would be like to pack for the journey, how they would feel saying their goodbyes to their family and friends they would leave behind and the hardships they might face as they travelled to their new destination. At the fourth station, children considered what life would be like in a refugee camp whilst they waited to be granted asylum and the emotions they would experience when they arrived in a new country, being unable to speak the language and dealing with unfamiliar customs. The children concluded their pilgrimage by considering how they could make people feel welcome and included who were new to the country.

The Flight into Egypt- An Acrostic Poem by Iga

Many of the children have recently been studying the story of Mary and Joseph's flight into Egypt and have considered how they must have felt as refugees at that time. Mary and Joseph were fleeing from a credible threat of violence by the authorities of their homeland as it was Herod's intention to kill all baby boys under the age two years. Like many people today who arrive in the UK looking for a safe haven, Mary, Joseph and Jesus were asylum seekers.

The children in Year 5 were tasked to create an Acrostic poem in RE last week based on the theme of Refugees. Iga wrote a poem which was worthy of sharing with our entire school.

Rude Herod, killing everyone in sight.

Escaping on a donkey, only darkness no light.

Fleeing to safety, no trails left behind,

Under God's safety, protection and care.

Guided by hope, they travelled with Jesus God's son

Every step they took, God's plan had begun

Egypt was like Mary's and Joseph's and Jesus' sanctuary.

During the week of 10th February, you will see orange hearts displayed around the school. On Friday 14th February, all children will wear an orange heart on their sleeve to show their support for refugees.

Attendance

Every minute counts

Frequent absence can add up to a considerable amount of lost learning and can seriously disadvantage your child in adult life.

- 5 minutes late every day means around 3 days of education are missed.
- A score of 90% in a test would be a good result but 90% attendance means that a child will have missed around 100 lessons over a school year.

Attendance update


We continue to track attendance every week and work hard to ensure every child in school demonstrates good attendance and punctuality. If children are to reach their full potential they need to be in school every day, unless they are too unwell to attend. We will make home visits from time to time, particularly if we have safeguarding concerns or if a child's attendance is causing a concern. Even if a parent has called the school to give a reason for their child's absence, a home visit may still occur. We aim to offer both support and challenge where needed, but always have the child's best interest at heart.



Child Death Review Team Comms

The Child Death Review Team (CDRT) Newsletter is circulated to all partners within Birmingham and Solihull to highlight campaigns and share learning from local child death reviews.

Childhood Head Injuries

Following the recent death of a child who sustained a head injury the CDRT would like to highlight the importance of following the NHS Guidelines in relation to seeking medical advice if they have any symptoms.

Children are incredibly active, and they have little sense of danger, so it is not surprising that they are prone to head injuries. In addition, their heads are large in proportion to their bodies and therefore more vulnerable to damage than adult heads. Head injuries may involve the scalp, the skull, the brain, or its protective membranes.

Most head injuries are not serious, but you should get medical help if your child has any symptoms after a head injury.

Head injury and concussion - NHS

Preventing head injuries in children

Falls are the most common cause of accidental injury to children. While most falls aren't serious, active children often fall over and some falls can lead to death or long-term disability. So it's important to get the message across about the simple things that parents and carers can do prevent serious falls.

How many children are injured in falls?

- Every day, 45 children under five are admitted to hospital following a serious fall. Stumbles are to be expected, but more serious falls which lead to head injuries can have a lifelong impact.
- · Falls are one of the most common causes of childhood accidents.
- Falls are also a serious risk for older children. Each year, around 27,000 children aged 5-14 are admitted to hospital after a fall.
